THE WORDS OF JEREMIAH MESSAGE OF THE BOOK (Jeremiah 1:1-3)

I. Background and Setting

A. Ministry spanned reigns of Judah's LAST FIVE KINGS (cf. 2 Kings 22-25;

2 Chron. 34-36)

- 1. Early ministry may have INFLUENCED Josiah's REFORMS
- 2. Later ministry addressed entrenched IDOLATRY and IMMORALITY
- B. Witnessed the DECLINE and COLLAPSE of Assyria and the RISE of Babylon
- C. Early contemporaries were ZEPHANIAH and HABAKKUK and later were EZEKIEL and DANIEL

II. Themes

A. Primary theme is JUDGMENT upon Judah through BONDAGE to Babylon for SEVENTY YEARS (25:11, 12; 29:10; cf. 2 Chron. 36:21)

B. Secondary theme anticipated RESTORATION in a FUTURE Messianic kingdom (23:3-8; 30:1-33:26)

- IV. Current Relevance
 - A. The ROLE of the prophet
 - Proclaims a BIBLICAL worldview in opposition to the POPULAR worldview of the CULTURE
 - 2. Preaches REPENTANCE from SINS turning to SUBMISSION to God's Word
 - B. The CHARACTER of the prophet
 - 1. His unreserved CANDOR with God
 - 2. His uncompromising FAITHFULNESS to God
 - 3. His unrelenting HATRED for SIN
 - 4. His unflagging COMPASSION for Judah
 - C. The COURAGE of the prophet
 - 1. He CONFRONTED evil when evil was NORMALIZED
 - 2. He REBUKED preachers of an "EASY GRACE" who promised endless BENEFITS without RESPONSIBILITIES
 - 3. He PROCLAIMED a God who demands RIGHTEOUS living and sends His

WRATH against all DISOBEDIENCE
