## THE INSANITY OF LUTHER (Romans 1:17)

- I. The Judgment Has Been Made by Twentieth-Century Psychoanalysts That Martin Luther Was, in Fact, Insane
  - A. What would provoke people to think that Luther was insane?
    - 1. Luther was intemperate with his speech
    - 2. He was clearly neurotic, particularly concerning his health
    - 3. He had many extraordinary phobias
    - 4. Luther became a monk after a close encounter with death in a lightning storm
    - 5. Luther froze—to everyone's embarrassment—while ministering his first mass
    - 6. He had an apparent commitment to megalomania
    - 7. He carried tremendous guilt for every sin he committed
  - B. Many tend to overlook the fact that Luther was a brilliant student of law
    - 1. He applied this knowledge to the law of God
    - 2. He evaluated himself in light of the holy laws of God and found that he could never reach the standards of God's righteousness
- II. "The Just Shall Live by Faith" (Romans 1:17).
  - A. This passage revealed to Luther that the righteousness of Christ is provided for all believers graciously and freely
  - B. Justification rests solely and completely on the righteousness of Christ
  - C. Justification by faith alone is the article upon which the church stands or falls; this is the Gospel
