## Lessons:

- 1. Just as Israel became more and more like the Canaanites, the church has a tendency to become more and more like the world.
- 2. When selecting leaders within the church, we must be careful and selective, keeping in mind the Biblical qualifications, such as those in 1 Timothy Ch. 3 and Titus Ch. 1.
- 3. Evil intentions do not bode well for alliances. (cf Rev 17:16-17)
- 4. Sooner or later, God will have justice upon those who shed the blood of others or otherwise violate His law.
- 5. The gospel, or good news, is that Jesus has come to save us from our sin.
- 6. God is the protector of His people. (1 Cor 3:16-17)
